Theory of Change Model

A theory of change is a way of describing how the activities and programmes you carry out lead to outcomes and impact. It can help you to think through a journey from the need you are trying to address to the change you want to achieve, and the steps involved in getting there.

Developing a clear, concise and convincing explanation of the work you do can provide a theoretical framework for evaluating your impact and helps you know how to measure what matters. A good theory of change should help you establish if you are carrying out the right activities to reach your goals, what things you are doing that might not help you get there, which activities and outcomes you can achieve alone, and which require you to work with others.

We first introduced this model to delegates at our Adoption Support Practice Excellence Event in October 2017. Many of our member agencies have found it a great tool to be used in team meetings.
